
LA: No Pipe ~9,500' PUD; Possible 1.1 MMBO;



Major John Wesley Powell's 1869 Journey Down the Green and Colorado Rivers of Utah on His Way to the Grand Canyon

Past these towering monuments, past these mounded billows of orange sandstone, past these oak-set glens, past these fern-decked alcoves, past these mural curves, we glide hour after hour, stopping now and then, as our attention is arrested by some new wonder...

These words by geologist, explorer, and Civil War veteran Major John Wesley Powell, August 3, 1869, describe the scene as he and his comrades floated along the Colorado River in what is now southern Utah. Anyone who now travels his same route or visits the various national parks and surrounding regions likewise has their attention "arrested by some new wonder!" Powell is best known for his historic journey along the Colorado River through the depths of the Grand Canyon and the huge rapids he encountered over 150 years ago. However, of that 1,000-mile journey, about 570 miles were down the Green and Colorado Rivers through Utah.

Many of the scenic areas, spectacular canyons, and famous landmarks along the rivers were named by Powell and his party. These include Flaming Gorge, Split Mountain, and Desolation, Labyrinth, and Glen Canyons to list just a few. Unlike the rocks that range in age from Precambrian to Permian that Powell later observed in the Grand Canyon, the rocks he saw in Utah range in age from Precambrian all the way through Tertiary. Powell

described and attempted to explain the creation of many strange and wonderous geomorphic features, such as the Green River's flow through Split Mountain—a classic example of a superposed stream. Powell encountered incredible entrenched meanders, like the iconic Bowknot Bend, that added miles to their journey. They were awe inspired by beautifully vegetated alcoves now observed along the reservoir that bears his name, Lake Powell.

Although the most famous part of Major John Wesley Powell's remarkable 1869 expedition was the journey of what Powell called "the Great Unknown" through the Grand Canyon, he first spent a majority of his time exploring and describing the geology of the magnificent canyons of the Green and Colorado Rivers in Utah. Powell's expedition was truly a major contribution to science and an incredible adventure that still inspires a spirit of curiosity and sense of wonderment today.

Tom Chidsey is an Emeritus Senior Scientist for the Utah Geological Survey (UGS), having officially "retired" in 2020. He received his BS and MS degrees in 1974 and 1977, respectively, both in geology from Brigham Young University. During his 45-year career, Tom has worked as a production geologist for Exxon in south Texas, and as an exploration geologist in Utah and southwestern Wyoming for Celsius/Wexpro before joining the UGS in 1989. He has served as Rocky Mountain Section (RMS) President of the AAPG, President of the Utah Geological Association (UGA), and currently is a board member of the AAPG RMS Foundation.

Tom has a wide interest in geology and has numerous publications on Utah petroleum geology, carbon dioxide resources and sequestration, hydrogeology, oil and gas reservoir outcrop analogs, microbial carbonates, Mars rover protocols using Utah sites, and the general geology of Utah's parks. He also has been an editor/co-editor of eleven guidebooks and bulletins on Utah geology, and currently serves as an associate editor for UGA's *Geology of the Intermountain West* online journal. Tom has been the recipient of numerous prestigious awards, most recently the AAPG RMS Robert J. Weimer Lifetime Contribution Award in 2021.







Carbon Dioxide, the Gas of Life

by Dr. William Happer, Professor Emeritus, Department of Physics, Princeton University



The much-vilified gas, carbon dioxide or CO_2 , is in fact a benefit to life on Earth. The greening of Earth from the modest increases of CO_2 over the past century are already evident from satellite monitoring of Earth's surface vegetation. CO_2 is indeed a greenhouse gas, but its effects on Earth's climate will be very small and benign. The basic scientific data that supports these truths will be discussed.

Dr. William Happer is a specialist in the spectroscopy of atoms and molecules, radiation propagation in the atmosphere, and spin-polarized atoms and nuclei. He invented the sodium guidestar that is used in astronomical adaptive optics to correct for the degrading effects of atmospheric turbulence.

He has published over 200 peer-reviewed scientific papers. He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the U.S. National Academy of Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, and other scientific organizations.

Grey Areas: Interactive Application of Business Ethics in the Geoscience Profession

by John E. Jordan, Jr., #3590

Most large oil companies require their employees to have yearly ethics training which is often broad and dry. State licensees are also required to have one hour of ethics training every year; this talk will fulfill that requirement. Although I do not have a degree in philosophy or jurisprudence, I have been an international explorationist for 35 years and therefore I am aware of many situations where individual or business ethics were tested. I have been giving ethics lectures in the Houston area for several years. Several years ago, I gave a lecture introducing the theory of philosophical ethics and explored the difference between moral compass and ethics and how this relates to business ethics. The following year, I reviewed this model and then applied it to our industry with LIVE feedback from the audience via polling technology. This year there will be a brief review of the Business Ethics Model, a review of the SIPES/ AAPG code of ethics/conduct and focus heavily on examples where your business ethics are tested. in the lecture. Examples will be anonymous, and the situation will be modified, but the issue will be the same as submitted. John E Jordan, Jr. is a Past President of the AAPG DPA, Past President of the Houston Geological Society, and a licensed geoscientist in Texas. He is a retired project geophysical advisor who has worked for several Fortune 500 oil companies in California and Texas. Prior to joining Anadarko in 2007, he worked at Kerr McGee, Noble Energy, Arco, and Chevron. During 35 plus years in the oil industry, he has worked deep-water and onshore projects from Alaska and the Gulf of Mexico to the Middle East, Asia, Africa, and South America. John is a graduate of Wright State University where he received both a BSc and an MSc from the College of Science and Mathematics majoring in geology and geophysics. He does not hold degrees in philosophy or jurisprudence, but enjoys lively debate on most any subject.

POST-CONVENTION FIELD TRIP

THURSDAY, JUNE 16 — 9:00 A.M. - 4:00 P.M.

"Central Wasatch Range and Park City Field Trip"

Led by Dr. Ron A. Harris, Professor of Geological Sciences, Brigham Young University



The Park City area is at the heart of one of the most diverse, well-exposed and accessible geological repositories on Earth. Features of nearly every geological event that shaped the face of western North America are represented. This field trip will visit the most accessible of these features exposed in the canyons of the central Wasatch Range (Figure 1). These canyons are like a series of 2 km deep serial sections through a part of Earth's crust that has experienced a complete Wilson Cycle, and provide a three-dimensional display of several chronicles of Earth history and processes.

The trip will mostly move from the oldest chronicles to the youngest. The journey through time starts at outcrops that document dramatic climate swings from icehouse to greenhouse conditions in the late Pre-Cambrian before trilobites saved the day (Chronicles of Rodinia). Next we will walk through a marine transgression that flooded western North America and deposited around 10 km of sediment in the Oquirrh Basin (Chronicles of Panthalassa). Our next few stops will inspect fold and thrust sections (Figure 2) of these sedimentary units that were deformed by arrival of the Sevier foreland thrust belt at



around 100 Ma (Chronicles of Cordillera, part 1). We will then visit exposures of igneous bodies and deposits signaling the arrival of the volcanic arc to the area (Chronicles of Cordillera, part 2). Park City was founded to mine the mineral deposits caused by this short magmatic event.

In multiple places throughout the journey we will traverse the active Wasatch Fault, which formed the Wasatch Range and threatens the livelihood of the 2 million people that live on top of it.



Dr. Ron Harris is a Professor of Geological Sciences at BYU who specializes in plate tectonics and associated geophysical hazards. He was born and raised in Oregon and received his BSc. in Geological Sciences from the University of Oregon. He also has a Masters Degree in Geophysics from the Geophysical Institute of Alaska, and a Ph.D in Geodynamics from University College London in the U.K.






